Cooperative Extension Statewide Community Needs Assessment



The statewide needs assessment was conducted to identify and prioritize community needs, issues, and/or opportunities that Extension could address through targeted educational programming and engagement efforts. The survey was divided into 4 sections: 1) Agriculture and Natural Resources, 2) **Youth Development**, 3) Family and Individual Development, and 4) Community and Economic Development.



For counties with small populations and small population groups, the <u>margins of error</u> (indicated by a +/-___) or confidence intervals (indicated by a range) can be quite large.

The margin of error or confidence interval tells us how precise the estimate is by indicating the range within which the estimate most likely falls.
